Christological Thoughts for an Anxious Church

M. Craig Barnes is president of Princeton Theological Seminary. Raised on Long Island, New York, after graduating from The King's College and Princeton Theological Seminary, he received a PhD in the history of Christianity from the University of Chicago. He has served as a pastor to three congregations, including the National Presbyterian Church in Washington, DC. He also served as the Meneilly Professor of Pastoral Ministry at Pittsburgh Seminary while also serving as the senior pastor of Shadyside Presbyterian Church. He has eight published books and serves as an editor-at-large and frequent contributor to *The Christian Century*.

David Fergusson is professor of divinity at New College, University of Edinburgh. His most recent publication is *The Providence of God: A Polyphonic Approach*. He is currently coediting (with Mark Elliott) a three-volume history of Scottish theology.

Scott Hagley teaches missiology at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. Before moving to Pittsburgh, he served as director of education at Forge Canada, where he developed curriculum for the formation of missional leaders in hubs across Canada. He also served as teaching pastor at Southside Community Church, a church in the Vancouver area organized around neighborhood-based missional communities.

Angela Dienhart Hancock is associate professor of homiletics and worship at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. An ordained PC(USA) minister, she is the author of *Karl Barth's Emergency Homiletic, 1932–1933: A Summons to Prophetic Witness at the Dawn of the Third Reich*, a contextual interpretation of Barth's lectures on preaching in the early 1930s.


Trygve Johnson is the Hinga Boersma Dean of the Chapel of Hope College. He holds an MDiv from Western Theological Seminary, a PhD in theology from the University of St. Andrews, Scotland, and is ordained in the Reformed Church in America (RCA). He is author of *The Preacher as Liturgical Artist* and speaks widely on college campuses and churches around the country.

L. Roger Owens is associate professor of Christian spirituality and ministry at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. Ordained in the United Methodist Church, he is the author of a number of books, including Abba, Give Me a Word: The Path of Spiritual Direction; What We Need Is Here: Practicing the Heart of Christian Spirituality; and Threshold of Discovery: A Field Guide to Spirituality in Midlife.

Anthony B. Robinson is an ordained minister of the United Church of Christ. He has served four congregations as pastor and teacher, and has taught and lectured at a number of seminaries, including Andover Newton, Emmanuel College, and Seattle Pacific University. He is the author of a dozen books, including *Transforming Congregational Culture*; Called to be Church: The Book of Acts for a New Day, and Changing the Conversation: A Third Way for Congregations. He lives in Seattle with his wife, Linda.

Andrew Root, (PhD, Princeton Theological Seminary) is the Carrie Olson Baalson Professor of Youth and Family Ministry at Luther Seminary. He is most recently the author of the Ministry in a Secular Age series: volume one, Faith Formation in a Secular Age, and volume two, The Pastor in a Secular Age: Ministry to People Who No Longer Need a God.

Edwin Chr. van Driel occupies the Directors' Bicentennial Chair of Theology at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. He is the author of *Incarnation Anyway: Arguments for Supralapsarian Christology* and is working on *Rethinking Paul: Protestant Theology and Contemporary Exegesis.* He is also the editor of the *T&T Clark Companion to Election* (forthcoming). Ordained in the PC(USA), he served on the committee that produced the new denominational hymnal *Glory to God* (2013) and regularly leads worship and retreats in local congregations.

Will Willimon is professor of the practice of Christian ministry at Duke Divinity School and a United Methodist bishop, retired. His recent books include *Who Lynched Willie Earle?* and *Accidental Preacher*.

John D. Witvliet directs the Calvin Institute of Christian Worship and teaches worship and theology at Calvin College and Calvin Theological Seminary. He is the author of *The Biblical Psalms in Christian Worship* and *Worship Seeking Understanding*, and coauthor or collaborating editor of several academic books, hymnals, and children's books related to worship.

Nicholas Wolterstorff is Noah Porter Professor Emeritus of Philosophical Theology at Yale University and Senior Research Fellow in the Institute for Advanced Studies in Culture at the University of Virginia. He has been president of the American Philosophical Association and of the Society of Christian Philosophers, and is a fellow if the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. Among his publications are *The God We Worship* and *Acting Liturgically*.

Dwight Zscheile is vice president of innovation and associate professor of congregational mission and leadership at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota. Ordained in the Episcopal Church, he is the author of several books on missiology, leadership, and innovation for the church.
